SNEAKIN' A PEEK!

This column appears as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a more detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes! How about this, gang? To better identify possible kit reviews, at the end of the item on the kit, the words 'Available' or 'Not Available' will appear. Obviously, a club member may reserve any kit that is available with a simple call to the Editor. Conversely, a kit which is 'Not Available' was either already reserved by someone, or was something new inserted by yours truly, and paid for with my hard-earned moolah! (Ed. Note: The kits are listed in no particular order):

- 'New Thunderbird' (Revell 'Wheels of Fire' #1916): Molded in red, black, and chrome...nice rendition of the Thunderbird concept car touring the country, preparing the public for the next-gen 'Bird....no engine (curbside)....tub-style interior w/two-piece bucket seats, drop-in door panel, and dash gauge face markings (adhesive-backed)....option of tonneau cover or up-top (w/porthole!) included....separate grille, headlights, clear red tail lights....chrome wheels and rubber tires....stylized Thunderbird logo for side of car, along with 'Thunderbird' script for rocker panel, 'T 2000' plate, and aforementioned gauge face marking. (Available)
- '57 Chevy Bel Air (Revell 'Wheels of Fire' #1912): Molded in black red, and chrome....tub-style interior, with drop-in door panels....one-piece chassis....chrome hubcaps mounting tires which include whitewall inserts....chrome headlight bezels, w/clear lenses.... adhesive-backed peel and stick markings include flame decals for sides of car, 'FINS' plate, Bel Air side cove trim, and a few scripts for the sides of the car as well. (Available)
- 'Badman' (Monogram Classic #0229): Molded in Yellow....Apparent straight reissue of the original classic '55 Chevy, molded in yellow...15-piece supercharged small block V-8....tub-style interior, mounting two racing buckets, dash, steering column/wheel, three-piece roll cage, separate pedals, fire extinguisher, shifter, and trans tunnel....chrome straight front axle, simplified rear suspension w/ladder bars and wheelie bars....'Badman' trading card included. (Available)
- Quaker State March Indy Car (Monogram #4171): Molded in white....Straight reissue....Multi-piece Porsche V-8....five-piece driver figure included...choice of Road Course or Speedway configurations for front and rear wings....decal sheet is small, but appears to be very crisp, and inclusive of all necessary markings. (Available)
- Mazda MX-5 Miata Complete (Revell #2156): Molded in red, and chrome....Straight reissue....simplified engine and trans unit included....simplified front and rear suspensions....two-piece exhaust system....platform-style interior w/separate, drop-in door panels....two-piece (each) bucket seats....four-piece radiator....disc brakes all around....outside rear view mirrors w/separate chrome faces....choice up convertible top, stock boot, or racing boot....decals consist of twin black and white stripes for the hood and trunk, black and white stripes for the rocker panels, and single license plate....also included is a set of paints, paintbrush, and a small tube of glue. (Available)
- #28 "Havoline" Thunderbird (Revell #2990): Molded in white....with the exception of the very nice gold foil graphics, a straight reissue of the company's excellent '87/'88 (a.k.a. 'Bullet Nose') T-Bird... (Available)
- 1940 Ford Convertible ProModeler (Monogram #5961): Molded in White...multi-piece chassis, w/separate 'X' member....upper and lower hoses....brake backing plates, complete with detail!...rolling stock choices consist of either skinnies with wide whitewalls, steel rims, dog dish hubcaps, and trim rings, or big 'n little Goodyear Eagle ST tires, mounting slotted wheels....platform-style interior....separate sunvisors, dash cluster, shifter, and pedals....separate running boards and rear fenders....(white) molded up convertible top or boot....Edelbrock chrome cylinder heads, beehive oil filter, and twin-carb intake....choice of single or dual exhausts....2-speedrear end....billet steering wheel....decals include flames, (5) sets of license plates, (1) set of 'Ford' ovals, (2) sets of tag frames: '1940 Ford-Flatheads Forever (black/silver), and 'Ford' (gold/silver),; (3) gauge clusters- black or white faces, and one stock, red and white scallops, and assorted sponsor decals. (Not Available).

'68 GTO Street Machine (Revell #2985): Molded in white....straight reissue of earlier '68 GTO, this time in white....tunnelram-equpipped 400 cu. in. V-8....interior is straight from the '69 GTO..., and therefore, totally incorrect for the '68 (darn!)...Goodyear GT Radials mounting a nice set of five-spoke mags....platform-style interior....sidepipes....'69 Judge spoiler included....decals include flames for fenders of car, '400 cu in' markings for the hood (?!), a 'GTO' band for the windshield, and a set of CA plates - 'GOAT', along with GR-RRR', and 'GOAT' generic plates....box art features a stylized drawing of the car on the top and end flaps, and pictures on the side (Not Available).

[Note to all concerned: It has been brought to my attention of late that there is a potential problem with regard to the review articles published in this newsletter. Let me give you a little background on this subject. The model manufacturers (AMT/ERTL, Revell-Monogram, and Lindberg) all attempt to send our club current releases in exchange for our critiques on what we liked and didn't like about them. That means that we need to get written reviews published in the newsletter in a reasonable time frame to accomplish this. If you will recall, I have stood up at recent club meetings to enlist the aid of the members in attendance to get kit reviews. At present, Ron Hamilton has done more than his fair share of reviews. In the past, Lyle Willits also did his share of reviews, as well as yer Fearless Editor. If anyone wishes to see reviews written by someone else (or take a crack at it him or herself), they need to contact me, in order to determine which kits are available for review. I don't have the time to chase anyone down and browbeat him or her for a review. Rest assured though, if you take a review sample, I will be your worst nightmare if I don't get a review within a reasonable time (right, Leonard?). You may also rest assured that if you take a kit for a review, and do not return a review of it within a reasonable time, that you will not receive another!]

<u>Street Scene Display Case</u> [Revell #1331]

Here we have another variation of display cases, for those of you out there who have no large display case of sorts, to keep the dust off of your masterpieces.

This particular one is a portion of a street and a corner. Visible is a portion of a crosswalk, and a street light, which mounts on the sidewalk. While perusing another club newsletter, it was pointed out how 'politically incorrect' this diorama really is, what with no handicap access at the corner! The street is weathered somewhat, displaying areas which would simulate the area where the car's tires would roll.

This is topped off with a large, clear cover, and backed by a backdrop, all in the guise of adding a bit more realism and interest to the display, which it does.

Other display cases in this lineup include an Off-Road version, which includes muddy tire tracks on a grassy green base (and a skeleton, to boot!), and for you roundy-rounders, a NASCAR-inspired pit road case, which includes a section of pit road, showing the pit stall markings, a portion of the wall. Each has an appropriate backdrop. The NASCAR version can even be linked to other NASCAR cases, allowing you to build a pit road diorama. Recommended!

'40 Ford Convertible

[Revell-Monogram ProModeler, 2 in 1 options, 1/25 scale, 190 pieces, white, clear, chrome, 2 sets vinyl tires, skill level....Duh, ya glue it together]

Getting right to the point, this is one fine kit!! The builder has the options to create an extremely accurate and detailed replica stock, fully factory optioned model or an equally accurate street rod with modern rod components. This kit contains all the correct "down in da weeds" chassis components for the street rod builder as opposed to last year's Pro-Modeler 48 Ford which left the builder to his own devices and parts box to "get it right" for a street rod version. The instruction booklet included is noteworthy in itself. There are many black and white detail photos of an actual restored 40 Ford and every color is correctly called out for each part.

ENGINE: 32 engine parts are provided to replicate a stock or rodded Ford Flathead. This may be one of the most accurate flatheads in plastic kit form and some components even come close to rivaling Replicas and Miniatures Co. of Maryland excellent flathead parts....well, maybe not, but the kit parts are pretty cool! Noteworthy are the separate front engine cover, the separate distributor, stock and finned beehive oil filters and the custom chromed Edelbrock finned heads.

CHASSIS:

The stock chassis consists of 23 parts and builds into an exact replica of the real thing. This assembly is superbly detailed and includes the factory-optional Columbia 2 speed rear end. (I think this is a first in a model kit). For the street rod version,

another 22 (!!!) parts are provided for the modern front and rear suspension, front disc brakes, modern exhaust, etc.

ROLLING STOCK:

Stock 16-inch wheels with molded in valve stems are included for the beautifully detailed new stock tires with separate white wall inserts. I suppose it could be argued that the stock tires should be Firestone instead of Goodyear, but they are really sharp, nonetheless. The chromed trim rings and Ford Deluxe caps are just beautiful. These are the first trim rings I've ever seen in a model kit that are in scale and fit the wheel, as they should. The street rod tires are 14 and 15 inch Goodyear Eagle ST and I believe are from a brand new tool also. Chromed ET style custom wheels and billet center covers are well done.

INTERIOR:

Comprised of 14 pieces, the interior builds up from the floor panel, which then attaches to the separate floor pan, which in turn, mounts onto the frame. All of the interior parts are very well detailed and accurate. The *most realistic convertible boot* I've ever seen in a kit is provided along with a *dead-on accurate up top*. Now...I know we can't have everything, but the *street rod builder* is *limited to the stock interior* with the *exception of a custom steering wheel* and a *gauge panel insert*. Oh well, it's fun to make custom interiors and I'm sure the aftermarket will come up with a few options.

BODY:

The stock version is comprised of 41 pieces including all external chrome handles, ornaments, mirrors, wipers, vent window frames and "glass", bumpers with separate brackets, etc. The front fenders are molded to the body. The two running boards and rear fenders are added separately. Very nicely detailed *hood hinges* eliminate the *old AMT "lumps wedged into the holes" approach* for keeping the hood open. The hood emblems and side chrome trim is very crisply molded.

DECALS:

Here we find really nice flames, 3 sets of gauges, 6 sets of license plates with 2 sets of plate frames, in-scale pin striping in red and in white, various small sponsor logos, the correct stock underhood markings and even the Columbia 2 speed decal for the stock windshield.

The kit bashing options with this kit is almost endless. Yes, the AMT 40 Coupe and 39/40 Tudor Sedan bodies fit this kit perfectly. For that nostalgia Revell 32 Ford rod you've wanted to build, all the parts are in this kit: the steelies, trim rings, wide whites, flathead, rear end, etc. Throw the modern Ford engine from the 32 kit into THIS kit and you still haven't lost anything. And, I understand a certain Mr. Rik Hoving, should be receiving his kit right about NOW, so look for chopped, smoothed, swoopy things in resin very soon!!

I haven't built any plastic in almost a year now...THIS is the one bringing me back!!!!!

Super Stallion Mustang

[Revell # 2571; 20 chrome parts, 38 white parts, 5 clear parts, 2 clear red parts, 4 vinyl tires

Ford's SVE team built Super Stallion the 1:1 in seven months. Unfortunately it was intended as a one-off exercise to show that horsepower need not suffer in a zero emission environment. In fact this multi-fueled engine burns cleaner as the horsepower increases. On pump gas, 97 octane, it develops 545 hp, on E85 Ethenol, 100% alcohol, it develops 590 hp at 8-12 pounds boost from its supercharger. On pump gas the Super Stallion goes 0-60 mph in 4.3 sec., and 12.7 sec. @ 112.8 mph in the ¼ mi. On E85 it goes 0-60 in 3.7 sec. and 117.0 mph in the ¼ mi. It has a theoretical top speed of 175 mph, though until extensive wind tunnel tests are completed that won't be tested.

The 5.4 L DOHC modular engine in the Revell kit consists of 16 pieces and should build up to look good despite the fact it is somewhat simplified. The front cover and the serpentine belt are one piece as are the cylinder heads and the intake manifold. But there are upper and lower radiator hoses and it has race type headers and tons of chrome. Believe it or not the chrome is correct for this kit.

This entire kit seems to be based on the snaptite kit, though very little seems to suffer for it. The interior has only 9 pieces and a decal for the gauges. The chassis has a separate exhaust system, 4-piece front suspension and a 3 piece rear suspension, though the latter should be an independent rear suspension. It was this car that helped develop the IRS for the '99 Mustang. All 4 corners have unchromed disc brakes. The kit brakes seem to measure out to 12" even though the 1:1 has 13" front and 12" rear brakes. I wouldn't complain about such a slight difference ,especially when you consider that Revell has included cross-drilled dot pattern decals for both sides of all 4 rotors and Brembo decals for the calipers. Way to go Revell!! The tires on the 1:1 car are 265/40ZR-18" while the kits are 245/45ZR-17". While this is not correct it's a great deal closer than other kits in the past.. The kit wheels depict the real ones very well, but the chrome needs to be toned down a little with clear flat or metalizer. I suspect this is what Revell expects us to do. There are carbon fiber decals to fit on the

fake side scoops for the rear side windows and the lower body. The windows are one-piece front, rear and sides and there are clear headlights and driving lights with chrome reflectors for the driving lights. The engine hood has been correctly modified to duplicate the real one.

The decal sheet contains all of the green stripes needed plus a stripe of blue to help simplify duplicating the unusual paint job. There are carbon fiber decals for the ground effects panels as well as "Super Stallion" lettering for the front and rear bumpers and labels for the engines cam covers.

Despite a few short cuts this kit should build up to be a very nice model. Those who like to be real picky can correct those few problems if they want. Kudos to Revell.

"Interstate Batteries" Pontiac Grand Prix [Revell #1645; 60+ pieces; Pre-painted body; molded in lt. Gray, black, and clear]

The 'Interstate Batteries' Pontiac Grand Prix was released this year in Revell's regular glue line-up, alongside the 'Caterpillar' Grand Prix. This version is in their new Skill Level 2 snap series of kits. These kits have a slightly increased level of difficulty, due toot the addition of engines with opening hoods, and driver figures.

Engine: Yup, this one's got an engine. It is actually a decent rendition of the new SB2, which the GM teams are running. It has the usual longitudinal split, and separate oil pan. It also features a set of headers, which are one piece each, a simplified belt assembly, manifold and carb, and cold air box.

Chassis: This unit includes one-piece side rails as in the glue series, padded shifter, dashboard, and seat. Vinyl hoses are included for driver cooling and ventilation. The driver's side window net is also vinyl. The simplified front suspension includes small metal pins for the front tires, while the rear includes a metal axle.

Wheels and Tires: A very nice set of their latest tires, with the Goodyear marking tampo printed on them. Open Bassett wheels show off the disc brake rotors at all four corners.

Body: The body looks properly aerodynamic, and includes the roof rails and flaps.

Glass: Already installed in the car, it is already painted black on the rear as necessary.

Decals: The majority of the decals are already on the car, so the decal sheet includes several of the smaller contingency markings, headlights, and driver items, such as seat belt, and helmet markings.

The kit went together very well, with one small exception. The driver's seat interfered with the flexible window net, bulging it outward. That wouldn't work in the real world, with all the emphasis put on aerodynamics. So, a bit of judicious use of a file to reshape it, and an attempt to 'adjust' it inward a bit did the trick.

This model, when finished, compares favorably with not only Revell's earlier snap kits, but AMT's as well. The addition of the engine and driver detail is just a bit of icing on the cake.

Team Rayhal Shell Reynard

[56 pieces molded in white]


This kit accurately portrays the Reynard that was campaigned on the CART circuit for 1998. This kit allows you to build the road course car or the superspeedway car with two different sets of wings. It also gives you two sets of tires, one being a set of slick tires, and the other rain tires, for the road course car.

The chassis is accurately reproduced with removable side pod covers but the bad part is that there is no detail for them to reveal so they are rendered useless unless you want to spend a lot of time scratchbuilding all the components for the engine compartment. The top engine cover is molded in one piece with the rest of the monocoque. The rear suspension is fine but it is mounted to a very poor representation of a transaxle (but for a curbside kit, it is what you would expect). The front suspension is fine with the lower a-arms molded to the rest of the monocoque. This is good in some ways as in durability of the front suspension to keep the front wheels attached. Now, to slow the car down as it approaches the corksrew at Laguna Seca, Revell has given you a fairly decent representation of slotted rotors and a set of Brembo racing calipers. Now to where the power meets the pavement - the wheels and tires. Revell gives you a set of two-piece BBS racing wheels that represent the real thing pretty well. With the front wheels having a separate lugnut but the rear wheels are all in one piece for the solid rear axle to fasten the rear wheels to the chassis.

The interior of this car is not very roomy by design. In the kit, they give you a two piece seat with detail including the sequential gear shift on the right and the weight jacker on the left, both molded into each side of the seat. The neat thing with the interior is that Revell has supplied a driver figure with the kit. The windscreen in the kit is like the other Indy style
