## Firebird Formula

(Monogram #2937; one version; 1/24; 76 pieces; red, clear, vinyl tires)

The Ponycar wars have always been hot 'n heavy. The Mustang LX and GT pretty much have things their way in this field, and GM painfully aware of that fact. Every year for the last Ford and GM were engaged in a honsepower war, which Ford has seemingly won with their lightweight Mustang putting out ponies in that lightweight body (and at an affordable to boot!). Price is the main reason behind the Formula, which was introduced in 1987. The Formula is meant Trans Am-like performance at a lower price and slightly less weight (Formulas don't get the Trans Am sero package). subject of this review is the '91 Formula by Monogram.

To stant off, the body is flash-free and seems very correct to the "distinctive shark-like front end from the Banshee" (Ed. Note: A quote from the instructions!). People seem to either love it on hate it, with no in-between. It is my belief that this kit has been re-tooled (successfully, I might add!) from the The "nose" carries the correct black grille work and clear lights as opposed to the Trans Am's bumper panking whi i coh smooth in this area and sports an added set of driving lights. Body side moldings are correctly molded on, while the time, the Aero package is missing. The newly designed rear spoiler exhibits minor sink marks which are easily fixed. The kit includes the infamous, newly relocated CHMSL (Center high mounted light, silly!) which is molded in clear and will minor painting. The taillight is also molded in clear (Boy, is it to be a Job painting it properly!). Separate mirrors contain chrome faces.

The interior exhibits nice engraving on the dashboard and console. Armrests are separate items as are the shifter and handbrake. Getting back to the dash, some detail painting would set it off very well. The steering wheel is correctly retooled (read airbag!), as are the seats. The car is equipped with a Sepeed, with the pedals molded to the dash.

The (5.0) engine, is a nicely detailed 18 piece TPI small block. The only difference here seems to be the presence of new valve covers. The chassis features some very nice engraving. We come to the only apparent fault that I can find with this kit—the exhaust system. All 5.0 liter 5—speeds and 5.7 liter automatics receive a twin catalytic converter exhaust system, while the kit provided system contains but I converter (I believe this would also be easy enough to fix). Brake detail on the wheel backing plates is non-existent. Included are Monogram's excellent unidirectional Gatorback tires and a retooled set of the new 16" Formula wheels (They look great!)

The decals are minimal, but include "5.0 liter" hood decals, "Formula" door decals, underhood decals, nose and sail panel Firebird emblems and a personalized "Red Hot" Colorado tag.

Monogram has instituted a skill level rating on their new releases. Skill level 1 is a snap together, skill level 2 is more challenging and skill level 3 is most challenging. This kit is nated skill level 2. This system should help younger modelers and those just starting out to select a model consistent with their abilities. In closing, an accurate kit of a current performance car that will make a nice addition to anyone's collection!

#### Sneakin' a Peek!

This column will appear as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes!

- \* Dodge Stealth Indy 500 Official car (AMT #6806): Molded in pale yellow...body retooled for an air deflector or lift-off roof panel (both smoked glass)...Strobe light with bar..."Official Car" graphics...Body-colored rather than chrome unidirectional wheels...smoked headlight covers still lack marker light detail.
- \* El Camino SS (AMT #6964): Molded in white...new Monte Carlo SS-style 5 spoke mags..."stylized" factory sidepipes...factory hood scoop...tonneau cover..."El Camino SS" graphics in black & silver(!)
- \* '70 "Vette LT-1/ZR-1 (AMT #6218): Molded in light gray...choice of building LT-1 or ZR-1..."full dress" rallys & "Open" rallys present...rectangular chrome tailpipe tips..."blanked off" dash...nicely engraved & nearly flash-free...instructions include capsule history of both LT-1 & ZR-1 along with notes in instructions regarding ZR-1 or LT-1 only items...black on white LT-1 stripes included...decals also include "350" air cleaner decal, radio decal(!), and owner's manual cover decal(!).
- \* "Hot Wheels" snaps (AMT #6170F0-'82 Camaro; #6171F0-'82 Firebird; #6175F0-'34 Ford Panel; #6174F0-Chevy Pickup; #6165F0-'82 'Vette; #6167F0-Dune Buggy; #6168F0-'55 Chevy; #6169F0-Ponsche)Molded in assorted hot colors...sizzlin' graphics...chrome included in some.
- \* "Maxwell House" T-Bird (Monogram #2942): Molded in Dk. Blue Metallic...very nice decals... same 'ol early '80's chassis (!).
- \* 25th Anniversary Lamborghini (Monogram #2935): Molded in red...nice, new OZ wheels...incorrect P7 Pirelli tires...all vents on body molded open..."2x4" bumper included (thanks to the Feds!)...minimal flash...top end of engine as well as engine batch incorrect.
- \* "Western Auto" Lumina (Monogram #2949): Molded in white..."Days of Thunder" or "Boodwrench" Lumina in new box with very nice decals inside (ignore box art, guys!).



## 1970 1/2 Pontiac Trans Am

(Monogram #2794; one version; 70 pieces; white, chrome, plear, plear red, vinyl tires)

Trans Am. Pontiac's entry into the Trans Am Championship Series. Pontiac was into aerodynamics long before it was fashionable. Consider the Monogram Trans Am, the subject of this review.

Postiac's aerodynamic research determined that at higher speeds, the Trans Am hugged the road best with a series of spoilers and air dams. The front fender air extractors not only vented hot, underhood air, they also relieved pressure that would otherwise have caused upward lift on the nose of the car. the rearward-facing hood scoop drew air from the high pressure area at the base of the windshield (It was functional until "noise regulations" closed it in 1973). The front air dam and wheelwell spoilers produced downforce, thereby "gluing" it to the road (Ed. Note: After owning two of 'em, believe me, it worked!).

Monogram did a good job on this kit, a re-tool of the '78 Trans Am. The body is molded nearly flash-free in 6 pieces- body, front bumper/valance, hood, rear spoiler, rear bumper and rear pan. The tops of the front fenders seem a bit too flat. but believe some judicious use of sandpaper will help. The bumper is also a bit fidgety in it's fit. The front fender extractors are actually separate pieces, but they appear to molded in. Some attention with an Xacto knife to make them appear to be separate pieces is called for. An underhood blooper if will permit me- to my knowledge, maintenance-free batteries didn't exist in 1970! The mide marker lights are also back-dated to 1970 1/2. Side view mirrors have separate chrome faces. underside of the roof is textured to give the impression of headliner and there is a dome light molded in as well.

The interior has it's good points and bad points as well. The seats have been redone in the proper upholstery pattern and low back bucket seats with headrests and door panels to match. The assist strap is missing from the door panels and the door latches and window cranks exhibit light detail. The car is equipped with an automatic (Turbo 400), and includes the appropriate auto shifter. The dash exhibits good engraving with a nice Formula steering wheel with a separate chrome center (which should be black) as well.

The glass is nice as well, with the front window having sunvisors molded to it. Headlight lenses are also included on the clear parts tree.

The engine, a 400 cubic inch, 325 horsepower unit (a Ram Air IV, 400 cu. in., 335 hp. engine is optional), is nicely done with little change from the '78 required. Of particular note, the carburetor exhibits very nice detail. Unfortunately, no lower radiator hose is present, The chassis also remains visually unchanged from the '78. The exhaust system, on the other hand, is all new. Sone is the catalytic converter/twin turbo exhaust system. In it's place is a new unit with proper dual exhaust flowing into a single transverse muffler and exiting through twin separate chrome tail pipes. The wheels are very nicely done Rally

II's with open slots. There is no disc brake detail on the wheel backs. Tires are Boodyear BT Radials which aren't stock for this car (F60-15 Polyglas white letter, bias belted tires are). But they are still nice.

The decals are minimal, but nice. They include both sets of stripes available-Lucerne Blue stripes, appropriately fogged at the edges (you are on your own matching the hood scoop!), and the White stripes w/black border. Also included are both blue and white "Trans Am" logos for the front fenders and rear spoiler as well as the small eagle for the "mose" of the "Rind and a personalized Illinois "Trans Am" tag.


Despite the few minor flaws present in this kit, I, for one, am very glad that Monogram decided to make the modifications to the tooling to give us this early 'Bird (Sorry, I couldn't resist!). With some minor modifications, it could be updated all the way to 1973 (and that means  ${\bf SD-455}$  status!). Botta run, so I can get started on my  ${\bf 1972~455H0~Trans~Am!}$



He was driven over to it for a closer look. Engineer Paul Lamar explained in detail his ideas rear spoiler. Following this meeting, Chevrolet worked out a deal with John DeLorean of Pontiac to buy the center section of spoiler and then put their own end caps on it. These turned to be the end caps out at a 45° angle which became spoiler. Furny thing is, this design was Pontiac's first but apparently, the Design Studio rounded off these end caps what they finally became! Believe it or not!
