* "Back to the Future" Trilogy set (AMT #8718PO): Molded in Med. Gray....features all 3 complete Deloreans....Lotsa pieces!...."BTF III" features railroad track to display finished kit...."BTF II" displays car in "hover" mode....This set will be available only in conjunction with the release of the "Back to the Future" trilogy tape set....so...the Future is now!


