

#### 1966 Ford Fairlane



(AMT #6926; 1/25 scale; 2 versions; 111 pieces; gray, chrome, clear, clear red, vinyl tires)

The most eagerly awaited kit of 1992 is here, and its even more exciting in person than it was in our dreams. AMT outdid themselves in terms detail and accuracy. This kit, along with several other recent AMT releases show that AMT has the potential to go head to head with the Japanese kits for US market share ((I just wish they would start now; by the time they realize that need to compete, it may be too late to start).

AMT is using a new concept in molding the engine to eliminate mold lines. They have molded the engine block in one piece. This allows the oil pan and front cover to be molded individually and to be far more detailed. The cylinder heads are well done, with spark plug detail already present. The valve covers exhibit well-defined "Power by Ford" markings. The exceptional level of detailing is carried throughout every part of the 23 piece, 390 cube 'FE' engine. There are no 'blob' parts. One thing that leaves me wondering, though-why, if this engine only has a single 4 bbl intake, are there two Holley carbs in the kit? Is there a Pro Street version looming in the not-so-distant future?

What AMT has done with the transmission in this car has made me very happy. First, they gave us the choice-manual or automatic. Then they made each tranny the best they could. The "slushbox" is a C6 that looks better than anything I've seen that was supposed to be a C6. My only suggestion would be to make the pan a separate piece. The 4-speed trans is the one that made my heart pump a little harder (Ed. Note: Kinda like those "Hooter's" gals, eh, Larry?). Not only is it a toploader, it's a damn good toploader. It's a three piece assembly with a left side, a right side, and separate linkage. That's right, I said separate linkage. AMT has given us detail freaks something we'll want to enter in Box Stock classes at contests.

The seven piece front suspension is over-simplified for my taste, but AMT made up for that by making it poseable. The front suspension assembles along with the underhood structures (inner fenders, firewall, and radiator support). The spindles look like they can be installed upside down to put the car's nose "in da weeds". You might have to use skinnier tires to do this since lowering the front end places the tires 'way up inside the fender.

All of the chassis components (exhaust, rear suspension, driveshaft) are separate items. None of these is particularly noteworthy. They aren't badly done, it's just obvious that AMT put far less time, effort, and funding into this region (remember AMT: the Orient is coming this way and they take as much pride in a rear suspension as they do an engine). While the 9" rear axle

looks like it was designed by a Roger Rabbit cartoonist, the engine bay details were handled much better. Upper and lower radiator hoses, a believable master cylinder, 2 horns, and a washer fluid reservoir bag are included and go a long way in

completing the underhood appearance.

The interior builds up on the chassis. Carpeting texture is molded onto the floor panel. An accurate floor console, with a molded on GT emblem houses either a manual transmission shifter or a "slush-box" shifter. Yep, correct shifters and pedal configurations are included so you can match them to the tranny you intend to use. Excellent! The seats, front and rear, are big. So big, that they remind me of seats in Monogram's Talladega. Boy, are they big! I'm somewhat disappointed with the door panels. They are separate panels and the upholstery pattern and arm rests are well done, but the window cranks and emblems are too weak to be acceptable. The dash face is well done, but the top lacks heater vent and speaker grille detail. The steering wheel looks real good--just don't install it upside-down as the instruction sheet would have you do.

Firestone F70-15 Wide Oval Super Sport tires mount on Ford's styled steel wheels. These new tires are an overdue and welcome change. Party on. The wheels could be accurate replicas of the actual Ford wheels--and monkeys may fly from my hind parts. In all seriousness, the wheels are the weakest point of the kit. The concept is right but the execution is lacking. Better replicas may be found in the resin aftermarket. As critical as wheels are to the appearance of an automobile, you'd think AMT would've

wanted to produce a better wheel.

The crisply molded body features molded-on windshield wipers, pronounced "Fairlane" scripts on the quarter panels, and pronounced door handles and locks. The "Ford" script on the trunk is quite weak and will readily vanish under some paint. The "Ford" script on the hood is somewhat better. Separate body accoutrements (Ed. Note: Accoutre what?!?) include hood vents, hood trim, GT and GTA emblems, rear trim panel, and tail light bezels--all done in AMT's typically well done chrome. The GT emblem for the grille is done as a separate piece. To cool.

The decal sheet has 3 sets of GT stripes in red, white, and black facilitating a wide array of painting options. Air cleaner and fan caution decals are included to round out the underhood detail. There are 4 sets of license plates--Illinois, "1966", "Fairlane", and most interesting--"Super Ford Magazine". There is also a General Tire/Special Events Performance Series participant

poster.

As I have noted before, AMT's new instruction sheets are the best among the U.S. kit makers. They give useful information about the vehicle, they print a thank you to the owner of the vehicle that was measured and photographed during kit design, they include building tips, paint detailing suggestions, and (in most cases) color and trim codes for the subject. AMT also lets their commitment to quality and customer satisfaction show in the form of listing their toll-free assistance phone number on both the instructions and the box.

Overall, this is a well done kit that was worth the wait and is well worth the retail price. I would recommend it to anyone.

## Scania 142H Heavy Cargo Truck 6 x 2 axle set up

(Italeri #762, \$52.00 retail)

The Scania R 142H 6 x 2 cab over engine (COE) was designed for hauling heavy cargo over long distances. The V-8 Turbo Diesel is Europe's strongest and most reliable, creating high speeds with low fuel consumption. The R-type cab has rounded edges and a slanted windshield which was developed in a wind tunnel and also meets Europe's stringent safety standards. This truck is used in more than 60 countries from Lapland to Australia.

Technical Data: Wheelbase- 4.20 meters/ Chassis Weight- 7715 kg./ Payload Weight- 19100 kg./ Displacement- 14200 cu. cm./ Output- 388 hp./ Max Speed- 112 km/h

#### About the kit:

This kit is true to Italeri's high standards, with 329 parts molded in clear, white, black, maroon, grey and tan. The parts are broken down something like this: engine (49), chassis (96), cargo box (14), cab (17), and interior (21). The rest are doodads (Ed. Note: I love that technical talk!) such as mirrors, lights, handrails, etc.

The kit had nearly perfect fit in all respects with very little prep required, and virtually no flash, no pits, sink holes or deformities. The only problem I encountered was that the styled steel wheels were supposed to be punched with holes and all were defective, some holes not being visible at all. I had to rob wheels out of another kit, and write to Testor's who is Italieri's American distributor.

The tires on all Italeri's kits are two part plastic halves, however they line up well and with a little sanding they

take on the appearance of real rubber. The kit came with a spare tire, rim and mount which is rare for most kits, even Italeri trucks.

Engine detail is as good as you can expect from any kit, with lots of detail. One problem is that Italieri never has any paint guides with their kits, so any guess is a good one unless you drive one and know what colors to use. I try to have the colors contrast with the engines and frames and use flat spray on the frames and no more than mild gloss on the engines. This truck kit, as many Italieri trucks, came with no chrome parts, which is ok since most fleet trucks are pretty spartan in appearance.

The interior has high back seats with a double sleeper in bunk form. The floorboard has very nice molded lines to simulate rubber floormats throughout, separate door panels, numerous handgrabs, a separate headliner, side and rear panels and

sunvisors.

The cargo van box was a separate addition to this kit, with the frame extension pieces included. The European cargo boxes differ from American ones in that they have low corrugated sides of steel, with a wooden or metal frame that is covered with canvas. I assume that this is to cut down on gross highway weight. Italeri did an exceptional job with this attention to minute detail such as having the canvas wrinkle at the edges and showing slight wood frame ripples under the canvas. The bottoms and edges are tied down with rope, cleats and grommets all molded into the sides.

Decals were nearly perfect and went on smoothly for a change. Italeri has a bad habit of trying to overdo the decals, requiring the builder to attempt to get the two dimensional decals to cover three dimensional surfaces, which never works for me, even with setting solution. However, this kit required only

straight stripes on the side, no fancy turns!

Finishing touches....the truck was painted in a light Metallic Blue to coordinate with the blue stripes that came with the kit (Box art showed a white base on the cab....too many white trucks already). The chassis was painted flat Navy Blue with a Seafoam Green engine, Black fenders and bright Aluminum wheels. The interior was twotone flat Blue with Dark Grey floorboards. Cargo box was flat Navy and medium Grey on the drop sides, flat bright Yellow on the canvas with dark Blue lettering. This kit was a joy to build, as with all Italeri trucks.

#### AMT '69 Chevelle SS396 Revisited: Variations

Last month we looked at what comes in the reissued AMT '69 Chevelle box and some things you could do to turn the mess into an accurate stock '69 SS396. The funny thing about this kit is that it's no more difficult to kitbash into a couple of interesting variations and conversions than it is to correctly build it as what it's supposed to be!

First up would be the rare and little-known COPO 9562 factory 427 Chevelle. (No one even knows how many of these were built; it is known that 358 L72 engines coded for this application were constructed, and that 99 completed cars went to Yenko for further conversion.) After converting the body to a true '69 as described last month (side trim and marker light mods), sand off all the SS 396 emblems. You probably won't be able to remove the grille SS, but you can cover it with a small, blue "bowtie" emblem as found on base (non-SS) Chevelles. Use the

factory Super Sport wheels, paint the intake manifold flat aluminum for the L72 engine, and dig up a 14" open-element air cleaner from the parts box (the Revell Yenko Camaro's is one of

the best). That's it!

For a Yenko Super Chevelle, proceed as above for a COPO 9562 and add the Yenko Chevelle decals available from Fred Cady. There's one more change to make: the wheels. The Yenko Chevelles were all equipped with either Chevy Rallye wheels or the Torq-Thrust-R-like Atlas mags. Why? Because Yenko's Chevelles, just like his Camaros, were equipped with COPO 9737, a "Sports Car conversion" package that required 15x7-inch wheels (the factory Super Sports were 14x6). (As far as I know, that little bit of information is a MAMA newsletter exclusive!) It is not known if the Yenko Chevelles were color-limited, as were the SYC Camaros; I have so far seen them in white, yellow, and Dusk Blue.If you can make the grille "bowtie" for the COPO conversion, you can also make a plain (non-SS) Malibu. DO NOT remove the lower body chrome strip for this one, but DO remove the power bulges from the hood-this might be trickier than it looks. (Fill the bulges underneath with epoxy before you start sanding.) Replace the kit 396 with a small-block Chev engine, as all big-block cars were SS-trimmed (except the above-described COPO 9562s). The engine in the stock version of AMT's '68 Z28, is about as close as you're likely to find to a Malibu's base 307 or 350. Use the kit's Rallye wheels, a correct Malibu option, and all the SS396 emblems will have to go. (I have a set of original '69 Impala wheel covers, which should also be correct; if anyone is interested, we'll see about letting one of the club's resident resin wranglers dupe them out). After painting the body a factory color, mask off the lower body and paint it flat silver or flat aluminum below the chrome strip (Model Master Non-Buffing Aluminum, airbrushed and coated with MM's Sealer, should be perfect.)

More subtle would be an SS396 300 coupe conversion. Rare and little-known, the SS396 package was available ('69 only) on the low-line Chevelle 300 post coupe. This was Chevy-s "Roadrunner Fighter", a no-frills econo-racer. Externally it will look just the same as the Malibu-based SS except for its coupe window frames and vent windows. Due to the Chevelle's curved side windows, this is another job that will be tougher than it may look at first. Do remove the lower body trim for this one, of course. A scrounged bench seat I made one from the back seat of a second '69 Chevelle kit) will add to the low-buck look.


Finally, you can build a'68 SS396 using the resin conversion kit available from Modelhaus (SASE to 3321 Ferris Drive, Decatur, IL 62521). Leave the lower body trim in place for this one, and paint matte black below it. Our own "Mr. Chevrolet", Lyle Willits,

recently did one of these and might have more helpful tips.






