1969 GTO Judge

The GTO, the Great One, the Goat. The intermediate car with the big engine from Pontiac that started the modern Musclecar movement. Completely restyled in 1968, it was the recipient of the "Coke Bottle" shape that was very prevalent at GM at the time, which made it quite a handsome automobile. However, its price kept increasing while sales were being lost to the recently-released "no frills" Plymouth Roadrunner. Enter the Judge. Intended originally as a Roadrunner killer (Ed. Note: Wouldn't "Covete" have been more appropriate?!?) when it hit production "Coyote" have been more appropriate?!?) when it hit production,

it was to become the "Ultimate GTO" for 1969. It was supposed to mimic the Roadrunner in the "no frills" department with rubber mats in place of the carpeting, and a lighter curb weight due to the deletion of some of the insulation and sound deadener. Pontiac claimed they were targeting a slightly more upscale buyer with this car than a typical Roadrunner customer, hence the carpeting and the full range of GTO options available. And to top it all off, a name derived from a hit TV show ("Laugh-in"), guaranteed the car immediate attention (as if the Carousel Red paint and "Judge" ID wasn't enough!). AMT has released 1/18 scale diecasts of both this car and a stock '69 GTO. We will look at both here, but concentrate on the Judge.

Let's start off with the box. This car is part of AMTs "American Muscle" series which could account for the huge American flag prominently displayed behind the car. The box correctly identifies the 400 cu. in., 366 hp. Ram Air III V8 (which was the base engine for this car) whereas the stock '69 GTO is listed as being equipped with the stock 400 cu. in., 350 hp. V8. The judge is also identified as having the proper "Carousel Red" finish

compared to the '69 GTOs light blue finish.

The car features opening doors and hood. The body lines look pretty good, but are not quite as crisp as they could be. It carries all the requisite Judge striping, and logos on all corners of the car including the emblem on the glove box door (which early Judges did not receive). It has the correct, unique rear deck spoiler, a hood tach, and hidden headlights as well. It has personalized tags that read "GUILTY" (Love that sense of humor, AMT!). The car was finished in the aforementioned Carousel Red and sees pretty smooth and shiny.

The interior is done in black (the real car was also available in white). It is equipped with a four-speed. The wheels steer from the steering wheel. There are gauge decals present on the dash (and hood tach), as well as smaller woodgrain appliques on the lower dash surfaces. An inside rear view mirror is also

present.

The engine is finished in the correct Pontiac Blue and includes the heat riser tube and the ram air foam which seals to the hood as well as the hardware on the hood itself. The engine

also has the upper radiator hose as well as heater hoses.

The wheels are the correct Rally IIs but are not quite correct. The Judge came equipped with them, but they did not have trim rings and the wheels were painted charcoal gray and silver not black and silver. The tires are white lettered Firestone F70-14 wide ovals. The lettering appears to be stenciled on and looks pretty good.

The chassis exhibits reasonable detail, displaying pretty good engraving and the standard dual exhausts. The only minor problem here is that you are left with 2 good sized screw holes

from where the car was secured to the packaging!

In summation, a nicely done diecast that with a little bare metal foil for the chrome trim, and a little paint touch-up on the wheels would yield a pretty convincing replica of Pontiac's hottest performance offerings. Oh, the holes in the chassis? Unless you turn it over or display it on a mirror, who's gonna notice?!? The price? How 'bout the paltry sum of only \$19.99 (at Toys "Backwards R Us")?! For you Pontiac fans, or even you musclecar fans, a must have! Recommended.


guys sure about this?!?


