We saw several cars in various stages of assembly (or disassembly!), as well as the Daytona 500 winning ride. We also managed a peek at the car the shop is building to run at Indy next year. It was only three weeks old when we saw it, but the body panels, and bumpers were already hung. Robin managed to snag crew chief Jimmy Makar to meet Dale Jarrett's #1 Fan in MD (Me, silly!), at which time Dave managed to capture it on film (I hope!). At that time, Jimmy was presented with an AMT "Interstate Batteries" Lumina built for the shop. I was told that it was the first replica that they received, and it would go right alongside the Daytona 500 trophy-Cool! Jimmy also made several race fans day when he managed to round up an old tire for a good friend of mine. Three hours later, Robin directed us to a place called The Sandwich Construction (for lunch) a few minutes away which was used by the team several times a week.

When you pull up to this shop, you have some idea what to expect when Kyle Petty's "Mello Yello" Pontiac (actually a shell) greets you from the roof! Once inside, all manner of NASCAR stuff virtually assaults you from every direction! Sheet metal is the prevalent item, however, you can see autographed pictures, Sam

Bass and Gary Hill signed prints, and NASCAR diecast haulers! And wonder of wonders, the food isn't bad either! I guess we liked this place 'cause we ate here three times that weekend, taking

someone else from the club every time we went!

Well, from here, it was on to CMS, and the reason we came, the Southern Classic. CMS is more impressive in person than as advertised in Winston Cup Scene. Let me start off by congratulating AMT for packaging trees separately to protect the parts from scratches.

The box art shows a shiny truck but the actual model has a dull finish.

The interior is grey while the body is black.

The wheels are just like the real thing. The tires are well detailed mud & snow tires, and they will find their way into other kits.

The instructions are clear and easy to follow.

Putting the kit together was easy but the stickers (instead of decals) were the hardest part because you could not line them up with the body lines. They did look good once they were put on.

Sneakin' a Peek!

This column will appear as frequently (or infrequently!) as new releases from the manufacturers. The idea behind it is to give a "thumbnail review" of the releases as they hit the shelves with a detailed review to follow at a later date (hopefully!). We'll see how it goes!

* Nissan King Cab 4X4 SE-V6 (Lindberg #72507): Molded in Black....clear instructions with part names included...nice 18-piece V6 engine....decals include window sticker, (15/19 MPG rating), gauge cluster, strobe side stripes, and numerous underhood decals...steerable front wheels...nice Nissan wheels....BF Goodrich tires...instructions include recommendations of Testors paints to use (though not identifying which items to paint a particular color).... ...separate fender flares.

Bugatti EB 110

(Monogram #2436; 1/24th scale, 130+ pieces; molded in blue, gray, chrome, clear, vinyl tires)

Ettore Bugatti built some of the finest road machines in the world starting back in 1910. His masterpieces included racing machines with virtually hundreds of victories under their belts, but his most outstanding creation was the Bugatti Royal which was the largest car ever produced, one of which was recently sought after for thirteen million dollars. This Bugatti however is a horse (wrong brand, Chris!) of a different color. About the only thing Bugatti about it is the namesake, and depending on how you view your cars, you will either love it or think it rather foolish. It appears to resemble a squashed Pontiac Fiero with a screamin' 12 cylinder, 60 valve, four turbo aluminum monster that is a minute 3.5 litres. Don't let this fool you, the "Pancake" car will do over 200 mph and turns out an awesome 0-60 in 3.5 seconds. Gee, that's one litre per second....not too shabby. Ready for sticker shock? A cool mil or thereabouts!

Monogram has done another superb job on this kit, equal to the dramatic quality on the 'ol pink Caddy. It is apparent that high quality levels are attainable if one puts their mind to it!

The kit is molded in French Blue, two shades of gray, chrome, clear, and has very nice soft vinyl tires with excellent tread. The engine consists of 47 parts (!) including 4 turbos, and the accessory pieces. The chassis consists of 21 pieces, the interior 22, the body 17 as well as additional small parts.

The Positive Side: This kit has exceptional engraving, with highly detailed parts, and it is apparent that a lot of thought went into this kit, from its rugged engine to the fine touches in the interior such as rippled leather seats and engraved dashboard. The wheels are finely cast and there are lots of suspension pieces even though the car has a solid floorpan that conceals most of it. Even the four wheel disc brakes have the cooling holes drilled in them. Parts fit together much better than average, and equal to the overseas kits in all respects.

The Negative Side: Not too much to say here, other than the kit lacks colored clear parts, such as brake lights (painting just doesn't get it, and I would think Monogram would know this on such a high-quality model kit....this isn't the 60's any more, guys) and they also supply a colored decal sheet for the instrument cluster that is very nice, but would hide the detailed engraving if you were to use it, and then it would be doubtful if the decal could be used over such a small, highly-detailed area. The car should have had one or the other, I prefer the detailed engraving. Otherwise, those are the only "bloopers" in the box.

Although the kit is still under construction at the time of this writing, it warrants attention. If anything is askew in the final days of assembly, I'll let you know. Two thumbs up on this one.

Hot Lappin' at Charlotte Motor Speedway

The 3700 pound beast sits quietly but menacingly on pit road at the entrance to the garage area. A NASCAR Winston Cup Stock car. You approach warily, already wearing a helmet which feels two sizes too small. Having already paid your "initiation fee" and signed the requisite forms absolving the drivers of any responsibility for any damages, bodily injury, or death (!), you suddenly begin wondering, "What the H am I doin' here?!?" You manage to squeeze in thru the window, while silently cursing the lack of doors to ease your entry (later, on the track, you will silently thank God that they have no doors!). The seat, in most cases, fits like a second skin. You pull the racing harness around yourself and buckle it up (with some outside assistance, just to make sure!). At this time, he then takes a few more tugs to tighten these already snug belts, as if trying to keep you from breathing. The nice man will give you some advice-hold onto the diagonal roll bar with both hands. Listen to him! If you have anything to say (including prayers), now would be a good time while you can still hear yourself think. The driver gets the signal to get the show on the road (in a manner of speaking!). A few light taps on the go pedal. Clutch in. Hit the starter button. Suddenly, all H breaks loose as this land-locked missile into which you are strapped comes to life with a roar. You can literally feel the sheer power emanating from this mass of steel with 108-octane "blood" coursing through its "veins". Clutch out, the car is moving easily down pit road, not unlike your normal street car. Accelerate down pit road, clutch in, 2nd gear, still accelerating, clutch in, 3rd gear, turn one approaching. You enter turn one, below the white line on the apron. Before you know it, you are through turns one and two. You move up above the "blend" line toward the outside retaining wall down the back straightaway. Still accelerating, clutch in, 4th gear, turn three is here before you know it. Pinch it down to the inside of turn three, just waiting for the rear end to come around sending you backwards into the wall. Only, it doesn't. Make mental note to visually inspect grooves in track that this "slot car" is using. Lightly accelerate out of turn four, drift up to the wall entering the Tri-Oval, move down toward the grassy infield (the area where the infamous "Pass in the Grass" took place), drift out to the center of the track to cross the Start/Finish line. And that's just the warmup lap! You enter turn one even faster this

time, roar out of turn two, and manage to sneak a peek at the tach on the back straightaway which is hovering right around 6000 RPM (which equates to about 150 MPH!). Turns three and four are history, the start/finish line is a blur, and you ease off (only slightly!) into turn one, come out of two and give the slow down signal to the other car on the track. Coast low into three, down on the apron in four, and down pit road, rolling to a stop. Back in the pits, extricate yourself from the car. 
