A Note: This is the Fourth Saturday!

From the Baltimore Beltway (RT 695): Take Exit 7, Route 295 (Baltimore-Washington Parkway) south towards Washington approx. 18 miles to Route 193 (Greenbelt Road), and exit. When on the off-ramp, stay to the right and merge right onto Southway (see below).

• Dodge Sidewinder Concept truck (Revell-Monogram #7662): Molded in white...Nice 11-piece V-10 powerplant...front and rear suspensions consist of 6 pieces each....2-piece dual exhaust system w/decals for mufflers....interior/pickup bed molded as a unit, w/drop-in door panels, console/rear interior wall....bucket seats are 2 pieces each....1piece dash, w/steering wheel/column mounting to it, decals for gauges...Beautiful flame-treaded tires (faithful to original!) and MASSIVE 5-spoke chrome mag wheels (big 'n bigger)....disc brake rotors also included...Glass is bagged!!!...body comes in left and right halves, w/separate hinged hood, tonneau cover, and bumpers....top also included. (Not Available)

[Note to all concerned]: It has been brought to my attention of late that there is a potential problem with regard to the review articles published in this newsletter. # Lamborghini Diablo Roadster

[Revell-Monogram SnapTite; 28 pieces; Metallic blue, tan, clear, clear red, vinyl tires]

The *Diablo Roadster* debuted in the Spring of 1992 at the *Geneva Auto Show*. It was a *Lime Yellow pearl color*, and featured a windscreen so low as to be almost totally useless (but it sure looked good!). But it was a big hit. It was the Winter of 1995 before the street version was ready for public consumption. 45 to 50 percent of production (250 a year!) were Roadsters and continued unabated until 1999. It is the 1995-1998 Roadster that Revell-Monogram has produced in this kit.

Although there is a *separate engine cover*, it doesn't open. It wouldn't matter anyway, as they couldn't even include a rudimentary engine, as they did with their Acura NSX or Impala SS kits. This kit is obviously aimed at the younger market, with only 28 pieces, and Snap construction. What you get is *correctly proportioned*, I just don't understand why the *body* could not have been *polished and/or clearcoated* like AMT's Copperhead, or Lindberg's Atlantic. All are aimed at the same audience, and shiny sells better than dull.

The *chassis pan* is very realistic, with all 4 lower A-arms and quad exhaust tips. The *wheels* are *accurate in shape*, but too shiny. They look great, but need to be stripped and metalized. If you detail paint the brake rotors on the wheel backs, it will add greatly to the realism.

The *interior* and its parts are accurate, but molded in tan plastic, rather than the white as on the box art model. The *tires* are *Michelin XGTZ directionals*, though they should be *Pirelli P-zeros*. The set in the review sample show poor engraving or bad casting as the lettering and tread are all washed out.

The only downside of the kit has to be the *ghastly peel and stick markings*! Kids, please get your parents to destroy these stickers ASAP (if not sooner!), just hang onto the *Diablo logos*, OK?

Why *Lamborghini* calls this a *Roadster* I don't have a clue, because it seems closer to a *Targa*. There is a hard panel that clamps in place, but Revell-Monogram didn't give us this piece. On the real car, it stores on top of the engine cover. I will paint and detail this kit to display it with my *twin Diablo VTs*. In summation, a nice kit for the target market, which with a bit of work would also make a nice shelf model for the older 'kids' among us!

# 1966 Olds 442 Convertible

[AMT/ERTL #6275; 1/25th scale, modified reissue]

Last year, AMT/ERTL followed in Lindberg's footsteps in issuing a *mid-sixties Oldsmobile 442*, the Lindberg offering being a '67 W30 coupe, while the AMT/ERTL offering was a '66 W30 coupe. I can honestly say that even though I liked the Lindberg offering, AMT/ERTL's version came off much better in terms of detail and general body and interior proportions. The Lindberg version, in its simpler form, was easier to assemble, with the possible exception of the front bumper and grille, and lack of positive locators for the front and rear bumpers.

Even though this kit is listed as a skill level 2 kit, its high level of detail shows that this kit is marketed more towards the adult modeler, and it just screams out for the judicious use of aftermarket parts from the various cottage industry manufacturers.

Engine: In my opinion, this is the absolute best Oldsmobile engine assembly offered in any scale. This engine represents the 400 cubic inch V-8 with the single 4-barrel carburetor, and a 4-speed manual transmission. The engraving and texture on this assembly is nothing short of fantastic! My dad had a 1965 Olds 98, and this engine is not the same as the 400 and 425 engines were decidedly different. The engine includes the following accessories: Quadrajet carburetor, power steering, A/C, and an open element air cleaner, complete with engraving for 'Oldsmobile' and '442' embossed on the lid. Curiously, there is an upper on the A/C compressor, but none on the power steering pump or the alternator. Well, the aftermarket can solve this minor problem, if the builder chooses to go that route. Other underhood detail includes a beautifully engraved firewall with a separate brake booster. The radiator mounts to tabs on the chassis. Curiously, it is engraved on one side only.

<u>Chassis:</u> The chassis is AMT/ERTL's separate frame, the same unit as in the coupe kit. Very well detailed, but with a simplified front suspension setup. Notice that there are two motor mounts on the chassis, which line up with tabs on the engine block, for a realistic appearance. The rear axle and suspension are very well detailed, and include a separate sway bar, as well as upper and lower trailing arms, and drum brake detail at each wheel. This frame mounts into strategically located holes in the body and interior floor for a precise fit.

<u>Wheels/Tires:</u> Rolling stock consists of AMT's Firestone Wide Oval tires with the groove in them for the builder's choice of line color, a set of *Billet Specialties wheels*, and *a set of wire wheel covers with 3-prong spinners*, which are unique to this kit. They are well engraved, *but lack the Oldsmobile rocket emblem in the center*. A better choice in tires would be the American Satco Firestone, or a Monogram Power Cushion tire from the '65 Impala kit, as the Firestone Wide Oval was an original equipment tire in '67 and '68.

<u>Interior:</u> The interior differs from the coupe in that the convertible-specific rear interior panels with molded-in doglegs are included. I wish the manufacturer could have changed the front bucket seats, because, to my eyes, their shape is wrong. The '67 Impala SS427 includes the correctly shaped seats.

<u>Body:</u> The body represents the subject matter very well. The proportions are right on target, and are actually better than the coupe version. The builder has a choice of an uptop, as well as a convertible boot. Both of these items feature a nice vinyl-like texture engraved on them, and the boot even includes a few wrinkles in it, just like the real thing! I wish for a more positive attachment for the front bumper/grille to the body. There exists a small ridge on the edge of the front fenders, but one has to exhibit great care in that the application of cement does not ooze from the joint onto the painted surface.

As I have said before, no kit is perfect, but I can say one thing-AMT/ERTL has done their homework on this one. While the subject matter may not be dramatic enough to propel this kit to *Kit of the Year* among the modeling public, it is an excellent kit for the adult modeler. *Buy this one!* 

# Street Machine Superset (AMT/BIRTL)

#### '67 Impala Street Machine

[88 pieces; lt. Gray, chrome, clear, clear red, vinyl tires]

This is the same street machine as released it seems mere months ago. And, for that reason, I will not belabor the point with this kit, except to hit the highlights.

It still includes the *great lookin' fuel-injected intake system*, and *matching custom valve covers*, *billet aluminum steering wheel* and *mag wheels*. These three groups of parts are well worth the price of admission alone! Also included is a multi-piece stereo system. What I don't understand is, why a lowered suspension was not included for this great kit? And while they were at it, why not also include custom seats, and tuned headers?

#### '67 Chevelle Street Machine (Pro Street)

[108 pieces; lt. Gray, chrome, clear, clear red, vinyl tires]

This kit has been out before, but not foe a few years. It cannot be built stock, and while I'm not a big Pro Street fan, it depicts the subject very well. Highlights include an interior made up to look like aluminum panels, Recaro seats with seat belts and shoulder harnesses, full roll cage, and a smooth firewall.

The engine looks good as well, but should have a blow shield. Tunnel rams are not terribly streetable, and this feature also dates this kit. The alternator has a properly shaped bracket attached to it. The exhaust headers are my favorite pieces, with header mufflers cast integrally. The builder has a choice of velocity stacks, or small air cleaners, to top off two reasonable looking chromed Holley 600 carbs.

The chassis is 2/3rds stock, with a *tubbed*, or '*back halved*' *chassis*. The wheel tubs look more like widened stock units than anything else. The rear suspension features chrome spring shocks, and 4 trailing arms, not to be confused with the 4-link setups in use today. This can be easily rectified by use of an aftermarket 4-link setup, available from several sources. The tie rod appears to have been pirated from and off-road dump truck, and attaches to the lower A-arms, rather than the spindles.

The tires included leave me a bit confused. The fronts are the stock, hollow Firestones we've seen before (and didn't think much of them), while the rears are hollow Goodyear Blue Streak dragway specials. Although nice looking, totally impractical for the street. Also included is a pair of the previously mentioned drag slicks with tread engraving, and no sidewall lettering at all. Now, what I don't understand is this-why didn't AMT give us *the really great set of Pro Street tires* included in the '70 Superbee kit?!? The Centerline wheels on the box art model have been replaced with different wheels with a cross design.

#### '66 Nova Street Machine (Pro Street)

[114 pieces; lt. Gray, chrome, clear, clear red, vinyl tires]

And, last but certainly not least, this kit, which is the main reason this assortment should sell. This kit, and its 'sister kit' (the stock version) are so popular, I suspect AMT could keep this kit in continuous production. This kit is done 'right' with two minor exceptions.

The *engine* is a nicely detailed *small block* with a *Weiand dress-up kit*-dated but nice. The tunnel ram is impractical, but that's normal with Pro Streeters.

The *chassis* is really nice, wit wheel tubs featuring realistic ribbing, Pro Street rear frame, and long subframe connectors like a real car would have. Unfortunately, the rear suspension is a leaf spring setup, which begs to be replaced with a 4-link setup.

The *firewall* and *inner fenders* also feature nice ribbing detail. The *interior* is a study in contrasts. The *dash* has a *competition flavor*, but the kit has a *stock steering wheel*. Sheet metal door panels, with stock front and rear seats, and console/shifter. Strangely, *no roll cage* is present.

Nice extras include steering box (unusual for kits of this age), front shock tops, and an extra long-block to display on the engine stand which is also included.

There is one large decal sheet for all 3 kits, and most are horrible looking. Graphics are supposed to complement a paint job, but these are terrible. The only acceptable set is for the Nova, and they are still a bit too much. It consists of a tricolor rainbow stripe, and a green rocketeer panel motif with Heartbeat stripe. Either one is OK, but together, are ghastly.

### '70 Buick GSN 2 'n I

[Revell-Monogram #85-2583; 1/24<sup>th</sup> scale, modified reissue]

Well gang, here we go with the *third iteration* of this kit, *first issued in 1989* as a replica stock-only version of the *GSX variation* of the *1970 Buick GS455*. The second variation of the kit was that of a street machine with graphics, 'sawtooth' modular alloy wheels which mounted a set of big 'n little tires, a raised rear suspension, and a flat hood with a hole cut in it for carburetor clearance for the tunnel ram intake manifold, dual carbs, and ram tubes. This version of the kit combines the first two versions, along with some new graphics. I'm going to make this short and sweet. I wish the manufacturer would take this kit in a different direction, which would builds into a regular version of the Buick GS455. A couple of aftermarket companies, specifically, MPB Products and Performance Detail Products, produced photoetched emblem sets that would accomplish this goal. These sets may be a bit hard to find but that is the reason we attend the number of shows that we do.

This kit has been reviewed in the past, and I must concur that it builds into a *more than passable replica of the subject matter*. The *advantage* that this version exhibits over earlier ones is that of the *new decal sheet*, which gives the builder the *option* of building this car in *both available colors for the GSX-white, and yellow*. There are also new graphics for the street machine version of the car. I like them, as they are very contemporary. Unfortunately, most of the remainder of the street machine pieces are outdated. I haven't seen a *tunnel ram* on a street-driven car for some time now. Additionally, the *wheels* are also out of date. A *set of 5-spokes* out of the *Alternomad kit* would have given this kit more of a *contemporary look* and *feel*.

If you have yet to purchase one of these kits, and you like the subject matter, what are you waiting for? **Buy it!!** It is a good kit, even if somewhat dated. Now, if I can just locate one of those **photoetched detail sets! Hmmmm!**

- MD Saves the whales!! An article in The Washington Times details measures that the Maryland State Police are taking to resurrect their fleet of aging Chevy Caprices! Rather than shelling out the bucks for Ford Crown Victorias, they are sending their aging fleet to Patrol Car Specialists in Manchester, PA for a 'reinvigoration' which includes new engines, rebuilt transmissions, new brake systems, new electrical motors, suspension parts, water pump, tires, batteries, rebuilt radiators, seats, and trunk carpet linings. Additionally, the undercarriages are water-blasted, and the bodies are repainted as needed. After this procedure, they are warranted for three years. All this at about half the price of a brand new Ford. Besides, some officers would take a 350 Chevy over the Ford any day of the week, saying that the Fords break down more often than the Chevys, have less power, and are more unstable on windy days. All this to keep the 'tuna boats' (as some refer to the Caprice) on the road!
- More Power! Argh! Argh! For you guys of the *Mopar persuasion*, *Danbury Mint* is releasing a 1946 Dodge Power Wagon!! Price is \$118, payable in five monthly installments, plus \$1.95 S+H per installment. You can reach 'em at 1-800-332-6468, Monday through Friday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Eastern Time.
- More tasty 'Mints'! The gang at *Danbury Mint* is also set to release a 1938 GMC Car Carrier! It will feature a tilt-out split front window, tie-down straps and chocks (which will be stored in toolboxes on either side of the truck), an operating winch, genuine rubber spare tire, loading ramps (both of which store underneath the rear bed), and wheel chocks are some of the details on this piece! It is priced at \$139, payable in five monthly installments, plus \$1.60 S+H per installment. And last but certainly not least, we will also get a replica of a 1941 Cadillac Fleetwood Series Sixty Special (whew!). It will have an opening hood to showcase the 346 cubic inch, 150 hp. Engine, flip-open driver's side rear tail light for gas tank access, removable, genuine rubber spare tire, extendable radio antenna, dash gauges, and wood paneling and leather upholstery on the interior. This one is pegged at \$112, payable in 4 monthly installments, plus \$1.95 S+H per installment. You can reach 'em at the number above.
