A Note: This is the Fourth Saturday!

From the Baltimore Beltway (RT 695): Take Exit 7, Route 295 (Baltimore-Washington Parkway) south towards Washington approx. 18 miles to Route 193 (Greenbelt Road), and exit. When on the off-ramp, stay to the right and merge right onto Southway (see below).

From the Washington Beltway (RT 495): Take Exit 22 north, towards Baltimore. Stay in the right lane and take the first exit onto Route 193 (Greenbelt Road). When on the off-ramp, bear to the right and take Greenbelt road west, towards College Park. Stay in the right lane and immediately after passing over the Parkway, make a right (at the light) onto Southway (see below).

Once on Southway: Go straight to the second (2nd) STOP sign. Make a left onto Crescent road. Go to STOP sign and make a right into the parking lot behind the Greenbelt Library. Once in parking lot, look to right. The large, white building is the Greenbelt Community Center. Enter building using doors near fenced tot lot. The multi-purpose room is on the second floor. There is an elevator to the left of the entrance.

Note: The kits are listed in no particular order):

- "Summit" Trans Am Pro Stock (Revell #7660): Molded in white...modified reissue...new '99 Firebird body (as evidenced by honeycomb pattern and round backup lights molded into tail light)....also included proper new dash, to replace last generation dash....large decal sheet including all necessary sponsors and associate sponsors, even 'Goodyear' & 'Eagle' tire lettering. (Not Available)
- Chip Ganassi's Target Reynard (Revell #85-2325): Molded in white....6-piece driver figure....cockpit split longitudinally....left and right fuel filler choice....no engine....separate front suspension arms....separate side pods/wings....OZ racing wheels, w/2 sets of tires-slick and rain....metal axle for rear....front Speedway/Road Course wing choice....same for rear wing...mirrors molded to clear windscreen...nice, seemingly complete decal set. (Not Available)
- Dan Gurney's Castrol Reynard (Revell #85-2328): Molded in white....see Target Reynard above for remainder. (Available)
- McDonald's '32 Ford Diorama (Revell #85-7804): Molded in white....carbureted small block Chevy...nice brake backing plates....big 'n bigger tires, mounting chrome rims w/dog dish hubcaps....louvered hood side panels....uptop included....flame decals, Von Dutch eyeballs, Moon-equipped, and Eight ball shifter decals included....heavy cardboard McDonald's restaurant, using bottom of box as parking lot. (Available)
- VW Beetle convertible (Revell #85-2579): Molded in white....21-piece Vee Dub motor....separate interior side panels...hinged engine cover....uptop w/clear rear window...nice steel rims, w/chrome VW dog dish hubcaps...'BUGGY' IL plate. (Not Available)
- Blue Max Mustang funny car (Revell #85-7661): Molded in white....24-piece Ed Pink Hemi....Cragar Supertrick wheels mounting what appear to be new tires....multi-piece tube chassis....colorful "Blue Max" decals. (Not Available)
- "Channellock" Sprint car (Revell #2575): Molded in white....modified reissue....same nice tires, new wheels....same engine...."Channellock" decals. (Available)
- "Cartoon Network" Race Rig (Revell #85-1715): Reissue, molded in white...nice Ford Aeromax cab, attached to trailer which can be used to display 1/32nd scale car...all interior cabinetry, shop area, and tools, including drill press, bench vises, and grinders....what appear to be HUGE vinyl stickers are actually cut into smaller, more manageable sections-good thinking, Revell! (Available)

1:25 Scale Diecast Gas Pumps

I recently stumbled across a great deal (Ed. Note: Hope ya didn't get hurt too bad!). If you like accessories for displaying your models (hey Bill Richards!), get on down to your local Target store.

While wandering aimlessly around the store (Ed. Note: Matt does this a lot!), I came across an aisle in the automotive section that contains the gas cans, oilcans, and drain pans. Also in this aisle is a small assortment of "automobilia" like tin signs and diecast banks. A company called GEARBOX Collectibles out of Cedar Rapids, Iowa offers a line of diecast gas pumps in various scales, including 1:25 scale. For only \$9.99, you can pick up an incredible 1920's style Wayne gas pump. This is the one with the glass reservoir on top. Three different Texaco pumps (one all silver Sky Chief, one red and green Sky Chief, and an all red regular pump) are offered, along with a John Deere variant and others. The pumps are nicely detailed with flexible hoses and very fine tampo graphics.

Highly recommended.

USRRC 427 COBRA

[Revell-Monogram Kit #85-4149]

This is a repop of the Essex Wire Cobra. Unfortunately, the chrome is not bagged as the rest of the parts are, but it is shiny, and no flash is present. The stock windshield frame is still on the tree, but no glass, only the small windscreen is included. White is the color of the plastic, not the metallic blue of the original issue The decals will replicate the car represented on the box. And, speaking of the box, Revell-Monogram/B&S/Hallmark have taken a small step backwards with the type of box. It's still one piece, but it can be used for storage. The box art is very good, with drawings on the top and sides, and actual photos of the model on the sides.

This is another in the line of Revell-Monogram attempts to reissue with figures associated with the real car. The figures of Ken Miles, and 'Father Shelby' are very well done and worth the price of the kit. The Ken Miles figure fits in the driver's seat like it was made to fit there. Some of the decals are for the figures, a large COBRA for Carrol's back, SAAC emblem and his name for the shirtfront, and a small Goodyear emblem for Ken Miles' figure. Other than that, the figures are fully painted and detailed.

This is a Limited Edition kit and a Certificate of Authenticity is included, if that is important to you. Grab a few of these while they are around, so you won't have to search for one later, and end up paying collector's prices!



For those of you unfamiliar with this car, a brief history. In 1964, Pontiac was credited with marketing the first intermediate-bodied "Muscle car," the GTO. The car was an instant success, and other manufacturers soon followed suit with competitive models. As the years passed, the GTO, as well as its competition, found that the market for these cars, while still strong, was declining for younger enthusiasts with limited funds. The cars were steadily increasing in price, more or less

a unction of the way they were marketed at the time as fairly well appointed cars. Now, the savvy marketing people at *Plymouth* changed the rules. What they did was to release a car, which was more than competitive with cars in the class, but at a far lower price, through 'decontenting' the vehicle in its standard form. 
marketing person who was credited with naming this car came up with the name while watching TV, when he saw the "Here comes the Judge" comedy routine (performed by Sammy Davis, Jr.) on a popular TV show ("Laugh-In"). And, as they say, the rest is history! In the 1969 to 1971 model years, the GTO Judge was regarded as one of the top musclecars available to the buying public in both looks and performance.

When I 'cracked the plastic', I found that the gang at Testors has indeed been listening to us. The kit was packaged in a series of real boxes! The glass, chrome, photoetched parts, and other trees were in separate plastic 'baggies', and the body itself was wrapped, bagged, and protected in heavy cardboard to minimize any possible damage in handling. THANK YOU! I opened the instruction booklet to familiarize myself with the assembly process for the car, as I have never built a disassembled discast replica, other than a Pocher kit. I suggest that if you choose to build one of these, take the time to thoroughly read the instructions and test fit the various subassemblies of the car, as it goes together differently from anything else you may have been exposed to in the past.

The 400 cubic inch "Ram Air IV" V-8 and 4-speed transmission are very simplified, as it was meant to be assembled in rapid form for its intended purpose as a replica engine devoid of the real detail found in the plastic kits we are used to building. Ditto the chassis and posable steering. Once assembled, it looks decent enough, but again, not as good as the models showcasing greater levels of detail from the model manufacturers. A pleasant surprise is the interior, with its 'soft feel' seats. The body, in my opinion, while not as accurate or as well proportioned as the Revell body, is still well done. It comes pre-painted in a finish most modelers would die for, as well as having the decals pre-installed. This manufacturer has obviously 'been to school' with regard to its diecast offerings, and took steps to ensure that this one was as close to being dead-on as possible. Note that all of the chrome moldings on this car are separate plastic 'chrome' pieces, which, in my opinion, is a bit heavy-handed, but it is all based on perception. No model is perfect, but give credit where it is due, Testors did an excellent job. Compare it with any of the currently available 'build-it-yourself' diecast models from any manufacturers. Most of the others are not even close on this one.

Now, not all is right in paradise. This kit is not easy to build, not even by my standards. I do not feel that this kit is meant for most of the younger modelers in that it requires an inordinate amount of patience, and a gentle touch when it comes to assembly. The metal used in the body is fairly soft, and the screws are meant to be used only once. Also, if you opt to use CA glue on this model, make sure it is fully cured and outgassed for appearance sake. CA glue will leave a white cloudy film over the model, which is not easy to remove. But, if you can get this beast built, you will have a replica, which will, in my opinion, rival anything from either of the "Mints" offerings. One of the advantages of this one is that you can do a little 'detail painting' in certain areas of this kit to make it more realistic, or, for the really adventurous among you, strip off that beautiful Carousel Red finish, and paint it in one of the other colors available in the GTO lineup.

The question remains, is this a good kit? Yes! Testors has done an excellent job. The price is higher than what we normally pay for a kit, but the value is there (especially if you are a Pontiac zealot!)/. If you are into cars of this era, this kit is a must-have!







- Rumor Mill!! Right now, heading into the Fall season, the rumor mill is up to full speed, and here are some tasty ones from the gang at AMT/Racing Champs: 1957 Chrysler 300-C hardtop, 1941 Ford Woody, 1971 Dodge Charger R/T, 1960 Ford Starliner, 1963 Ford Galaxie, stock 1966 Buick Riviera, 1963 Studebaker Avanti, 1958 Edsel, 1970 ½ Baldwin-Motion Camaro, 1966 Buick lowrider custom, stock 1966 Nova SS, Monkeemobile (!), Fireball 500 (!), Raider's Coach (!), stock 1968 Roadrunner, Richard Petty Dart Sportsman racer, 1988 Mustang (?), and the AMTronic. If half of this is true, guess we better start savin' right now! So far, no word on competitors Revell, Testors, and Lindberg.
- Mint Explosion! <u>Danbury Mint</u>, that is! Let's start off with a White 1952 Four-car carrier. It features a detachable cab, separate wheel chocks, ramp stands, and genuine rubber spare tire. The cab features an accurately detailed engine, complete with spark plug wires. It sells for only \$195, payable in five easy installments of \$39 (plus two dollars S+H per installment). Or, how about a 1956 Ford Thunderbird? Complete with a 292 cubic inch V-8 underhood, to the lift-off roof, and continental kit on the rear bumper. It sells for only \$112, payable in four monthly installments of \$28 (plus \$1.95 S+H per installment). - Lowridin' Diecasts! The Gang at <u>Revell</u> are set to release an initial series of four 1/64th-scale diecast posable lowriders! A '39 Chevy sedan delivery, '71 Riviera, '61 Impala, and a '64 Impala will be included in this release. So, watch for 'em at a hobby shop near you! These should fit quite nicely with the new Racing Champions Lowriders series, too! Look for those at a toy store near you!!
- Classic Checkers! Mr. Gray has been motoring up and down D.C.'s streets for 14 years in his 1976 Checker Marathon(!) Taxi cab, stating quite matter-of-factly, that "It's probably the biggest cab in the city!" People bypass other cabs to ride in the Checker, making Mr. Gray feel like a celebrity. The venerable Checker stopped rolling off the assembly line of The Checker Cab Manufacturing Co., in 1982, leaving Mr. Gray and fellow Checker driver Herbert Joseph as members in an exclusive fraternity. They say they are driving two of only three Checkers left on D.C. streets, as working cabs, and it was Mr. Joseph who sold a Checker to Mr. Gray! The three talk regularly and often to swap stories, and info on sources for parts. Getting parts is obviously a challenge, and these guys stay in touch with a nationwide network of Checker devotees who belong to, what else? The Checker Car Club of America! One thing for sure Mr. Gray doesn't worry about while driving the car is getting hurt, as it is a tank on wheels. A few years ago, a Honda Accord ran a red light, and slammed into his cab at 15th and G streets N.W. No one was hurt, but the Honda needed some MAJOR repair work, while the Checker suffered a minor dent in the bumper, and a few scratches. A hammer, and some yellow touch-up paint, and the Checker was ready for work again! Mr. Joseph's odometer reads 300,000 miles (?), while his friend Mr. Gray's odometer is showing about 600,000 (!) miles. Asked how long they intend to keep these dinosaurs on the road? "Forever!"
- Web Caddy? General Motors plans to offer voice-activated Internet access in a car by the end of next year. GM will begin test-marketing the "Web Car"-probably a Cadillac, with World Wide Web access in the Fall. Great! - Mopar Heaven! That would be the new Walter P. Chrysler museum, near Detroit. Located on the same site as Daimler-Chrysler's relatively new North American headquarters and engineering center in Auburn Hills, Michigan, the museum is the first on-site museum built by a North American automobile company. The museum is scheduled to open to the public on October 5th, will include an auditorium to seat 125 persons, an automotive-themed gift and souvenir shop, a historical archives and research area and an exterior courtyard for vehicle displays and special events, such as owners' club gatherings. The cars will definitely be the stars though, and some of the cars featured will include: a 1931 Chrysler experimental turbine car, the original Dodge Viper concept vehicle, the 1941 Chrysler Thunderbolt, and twin-cockpit Chrysler Newport Phaeton. Another 35 cars will be parked on the lower level, in "Boss Chrysler's garage", the center

of which will look like a giant racetrack with eight performance vehicles. The lower level will also include a visitor's lounge resembling a 1930's dealer showroom, and a replica of Chrysler's famed "Room 13", the experimental dynamometer cell where legendary high-performance engines like the first Chrysler Hemi V-8, Chrysler 300, and ram Chargers were developed in secret. The cars will be displayed in context. For example, a Jeep will be displayed in front



of what appears to be a French village (Hey, Matt!); Classics from the 50's will be displayed in the driveways of typical 50's homes; Pre-World War II vehicles include a 1929 Desoto that was never sold, and found walled up in a Chrysler facility; a 1929 Nash that never left the American Motors plant in Kenosha, WI. A 1924 Chrysler Six, the

first car to bear the Chrysler name, can be seen through the window of a replica of Walter P. Chrysler's 1920's office. A cast figure of the man sits behind the desk that really was his in a meeting with three brilliant engineers he hired-Fred M. Zeder, Owen R. Skelton, and Carl Breer. The museum will include a scene of Walter P.. Chrysler's original workshop with a cast figure made from his grandson and Chrysler's original tool chest, including some of the tools he made. Museum officials have no clue as to how many people may visit the site in a year's time, conservatively estimating 125,000. Crayola Crayons museum draws about 300,000, Mercedes-Benz museum in Stuttgart draws about 350,000, and even Spam town in Minnesota draws about 60,000 (!). Who knows? If Mopars float yer boat, check it out!

- The Duke Boys are back!! Well, actually, 'Cooter' (a.k.a. Ben Jones, two-time Democratic Congressman from Georgia), the greasy mechanic friend of those durn Duke boys, who always seemed to be helpin' 'em outta trouble!
